AT THE SEPTEMBER COFFEE MORNING...

Our invited guest Diane Thompson, Curator of Castlemaine's historic Buda gardens, told us of her "labours of love". With help from 60 or so passionate, active gardening volunteers she works in and restores the gardens surrounding the charming 19th century gentleman's residence. Volunteer Rhonda Cross is a fourth generation Buda gardener. Diane described how Castlemaine is managing to keep Buda going, while attracting a steadily increasing number of appreciative visitors. Local tradesmen have done a remarkable job of restoring old drainage lines, electrical wiring, outhouses, and old Victorian aviary.

Diane and her band of volunteers have made vast inroads eliminating invasive weeds such as Bridal Veil, Vinka, Cape Broom and Onion Weed while opening up Miss Hilda's walk under the old Bay trees, and the steps built by Clive Winmill. Several large trees came down in the recent storms and were made safe by local arborists Natasha Harris and her husband. The old Sugar Gum at the front had become dangerous and it had to go. The enormous cypress hedge dominating the front of the house, having struggled to survive the many years of drought, was brought down by recent heavy rains and high winds. Every disaster has a bright side and the southerly vistas beyond the boundaries have opened up with lovely views over the swathes of restored garden beds and formal garden. Its removal is also saving the Trust the cost of clipping and maintaining the hedge, somewhere in the region of \$5,000 each time.

The house was built for Reverend James Smith, who sold his home in 1863 to Ernest Leviny, a notable Hungarian gold and silversmith. The Leviny's brought up their family of several daughters, who all became talented artisans in their own right. In 1981 the house, contents and grounds passed into the trusteeship of the Castlemaine Art Gallery.

AN APPRECIATION OF SHEILA BOX

I was shocked and saddened to hear at the September coffee morning that Sheila Box had died. I knew that she had ceased to attend coffee mornings, and that she was rather frail, but had not realised the end was so near.

I first met Sheila in June 1995 when I came to Castlemaine and she suggested that I join U3A, which I did. At that time the organisation was much smaller and most people knew many other members. She was among the founding members of the organisation and very active within the organisation.

At that time, Sheila held the position of Treasurer and later she became Secretary. Prior to my arrival, she had also arranged a very successful holiday programme. I remember her as being very active in several U3A groups, such as the Walking group, Music Appreciation, Books and People, etc.

I later found out that she was born in England and lived there for her early years. Her father, who worked for BP, was asked to move to New Zealand, and the whole family went there, and she grew up and went to school and a tertiary college there. Later they all moved to Australia and she had a successful business career in Australia, working for various large organisations.

She retired early, and opened an antiques shop in Malmsbury, but preferred to live in Castlemaine. She ran her business for many years and was very knowledgeable about antiques, but had sold it before I knew her. On one occasion, she held a discussion about antiques within U3A.

In addition to all this, she was a successful author and published at least three books, which can be borrowed from the Castlemaine library. She also wrote poems and other pieces for our U3A newsletter. Of recent years, she confined herself to music appreciation, as walking became too much for her. Nevertheless, older members will remember her efforts in the early days of the organisation.

Sheila was very talented, charming and industrious lady. I remember meeting her in the mid 1970s when she was a great help identifying antique china for us after we had opened our own shop in Barker Street. She will be sorely missed.

ABORIGINAL HISTORY – OUR SHARED HISTORY

October 4th

We return to the excellent "First Australians" series, the Indigenous produced series, which depict the true stories of individuals, both black and white, caught up in epic dramas of friendship, revenge, loss and victory in Australia's most formative period of history. Today's episode deals with early black/white conflict in the Kimberley region and moves onto the treatment of the increasing population of mixed race children which, at the beginning of the 20th Century was viewed with positive alarm.

This session will include a dramatisation of the final stage of Australia's invasion on the lands of the Bunaba people in the Kimberley region of Western Australia. It tells the dramatic story of the almost mythical character of Jandamarra who fought for the freedom of his people.

DABBLING IN HISTORY

ISSUES OF CONCERN

I would like to thank Eva Haarbarger and Frank Pederick for running the Issues sessions during my absence.

There's been a fair bit of head shaking regarding the federal government's refugee policy. Who advised that sending refugees to Malaysia would work? Who thought that the Malaysian Government would treat refugees humanely when they were not bound by the UN Convention to do so? The federal government is being badly advised on this matter. but sadly the Government is listening.

Australian honey producers are having to spend time and money on trying to prevent invasion of the Asian honey bee of Australia after the federal government withdrew funding for an eradication program earlier this year. The Asian honey bee competes with the European honey bee for nectar and has already wiped out 90 percent of the European bee in the Solomon Islands. The Asian bee also hosts the varroa mite which lays its eggs in the wax cells of the European bee and destroys hive populations. Not only is honey production threatened but, as importantly, pollination. A 2010 federal government report says about "65 percent of agricultural production in Australia depends on pollination by European honey bees".

The State government has cut co-ordination funding for the VCAL program that allows students to study for a alternative leaving qualification to the VCE. This funding cut will jeopardise the ability of vulnerable students to remain at school after year 10.

The State government has also abolished wood collection permits which, in the past, have controlled the amount of fire wood that can be collected from State forests.

Coal seam gas mining is causing increasing concern among farmers in NSW & Queensland. Diesel fuel is used to split the coal to release the gas and farms in the vicinity of mining are concerned that this will pollute water sources. Mining companies are planning on drilling thousands more wells to exploit this resource.

Wikileaks has revealed that an important environmental protection for the Great Barrier Reef was subject to a compromise to avoid a diplomatic argument with the US and Singapore. These countries objected to the Howard Government's compulsory pilotage scheme developed to reduce the risk of oil and chemical spills at the northern end of the Barrier Reef. Now ships travelling through the Torres Strait will not incur penalties for not having a pilot on board as long as they do not call at an Australian port.

What with all the current news of some European countries not able to service their loans it's interesting to learn that Argentina's economy is forging ahead since it defaulted on its loans in 2001.

SIGNPOSTS IN ENGLISH: HISTORY OF ENGLISH LANGUAGE

Following the Great Vowel Shift – perhaps the biggest single influence separating Old English from Early and Modern English, and the remarkable rise in the vocabulary between 1500 - 1700, scholars, readers, writers began developing tools, guides or interpretive matrices for those new and many words. Meanings also were changing according to needs.

We will hear about some of the earliest dictionaries and their characteristics, different purposes, types. Professed reasons today, for a specific aim of general dictionaries will be discussed. Participants might like to look at the treatment of words in different dictionaries in the Castlemaine Library. They might also like to bring to the session their own dictionaries, technical or general, for comparisons.

Values, words and modernity will be aspects in the second session “Words mean more than they ever meant before”. DVDs will bring out these points.

WAGNER’S RING CYCLE – A SHORT COURSE OVER THREE YEARS

Friday, October 21 at 7pm: An Introduction to 'The Ring' via what Georg Solti calls, "a comprehensive illustration of the vital leitmotifs, which are the musical bricks and mortar of the cycle", in 5 sides of the 3 LP records, **at Vic and Felicity's home.**

On these recordings Deryck Cooke provides an explanation and analysis of Wagner's system of leitmotifs with 193 musical examples either extracted from the complete Solti recording or especially recorded for this production.

Friday, November 18 at 7pm: “Wagner and me” DVD **at Peter and Barry's home.**

From a Jewish perspective, does Wagner's music triumph over the pall caste over it by the association it came to have with Nazism and Hitler?

Stephen Fry explores his passion for the music against the backdrop of the annual Wagner festival in Bayreuth and his family having been a victim of the Holocaust.

To a soundtrack of the music, Fry follows the Wagner trail to Switzerland and Russia in search of the origins of the music; in Nuremburg he explores how Hitler appropriated it.

The DVD includes 36 minutes of interviews not included in the TV version of this journey.

MUSIC APPRECIATION

BRUCE BAUD 5472 4574

Today we had 3 composers, Beethoven, Ponchielli and Felix Mendelssohn. We started the morning with some delightful Jewish folk tunes. This was a disc Bruce discovered in the Library. Jewish families have contributed an extreme amount to music. The musical selection from this disc were well worth listening to. Next we heard Beethoven's Fifth Symphony No 5 Opus 67 in C Minor. This is the famous symphony with the four note start has been described as 'fate knocking on the door'. This Symphony has enjoyed enormous popularity, not one you would become bored with. We then heard Beethoven's Fantasia Opus 80, for piano, chorus and orchestra. This work was composed in 1809 and included Schiller's 'Ode to Joy', which was to reappear many years later in the final movement of the Ninth Symphony. The Choral Fantasia is surprisingly not often played; it is a great piece of music.

After morning tea Bruce introduced a composer new to our music sessions, but well known due to one piece of music 'Dance of the Hours' by Amilcare Ponchielli (1834-1886), he was born at Paderno in Italy. The Dance of the Hours is a ballet movement from his opera 'La Gioconda', which was first performed in 1876. This ballet movement was also made popular in the Walt Disney film 'Fantasia'. The final work for the morning was the Concerto in E Major for two piano and strings by Felix Mendelssohn. This work was first performed by Felix and his sister Fanny on her nineteenth birthday in 1824. It is a great piece of music. He also wrote a second concerto for two pianos, but strangely neither work seems to have an Opus number, unlike most of his music. It was a completion of a great morning's music.

Reverend James Smith, a Baptist minister who had settled in Castlemaine after some years serving with the Colonial Army in India, had the house built in a style known as a Delhi Villa, with quite a marked Indian influence. He sold his home in 1863 to Ernest Leviny and when the last daughter passed away in 1981 the house, contents and grounds passed into the trusteeship of the Castlemaine Art Gallery.

Miss Leviny, as she was respectfully known to local residents, was an awesome sight as she drove her stately old Humber Hawk down to the shops. Most people made sure she was given a wide berth while she manoeuvred her way at her own leisurely pace. The little wooden garage at Buda, where this vehicle was housed, has become derelict over the years. It is now being restored as part of the continuing up-keep of the gardens. Unfortunately, Diane had to remove an ancient climbing Lorraine Lea rose in order to begin work. The rose was probably holding up this old wooden structure, but cuttings have been struck from it to be replanted at a later date.
